

What Council Tax will I pay for Borough Council services in 2026/27?

The amount you pay depends on which 'property band' your home is in. This is shown on the Council Tax bill.



Struggling to pay your rent or Council tax?

It is possible to pay it over 12 instalments. We may be able to reduce it if:

- you live alone
- you are disabled and your property has been adapted
- you are being cared for away from your main home
- someone in your home is over 18 and severely mentally impaired.

Support such as Housing Benefit and Council Tax reduction are available: you may be entitled even if you have a pension, or some savings so do check.
